Systematic Theology I: God/Bible/Humanity

Objectives: By the end of this course you should be able:

- 1. Students will learn foundational truths regarding the major doctrinal areas of revelation, bibliology, theology proper, and humanity.
- 2. Students will develop a greater appreciation for the study of theology explicitly based on Scripture as they engage in critical thinking about theological issues.
- 3. Students will understand better some aspects of the CCC Statement of Faith (intro, 1, 6, 7,).
- 4. Students will gain a deeper confidence in and appreciation for Scripture as the inspired, truthful (inerrant), authoritative, sufficient, necessary, clear, and powerful Word of God.
- 5. Students will grow in wonder, thankfulness, faith, obedience, devotion, and love in their relationship with the triune God
- 6. Students will come to understand the biblical teaching on the nature of humans and the significance and meaning of their fallen state.
- 7. To be able to explain the biblical teaching of the doctrines taught in this course to others in ministry.

Assignments

- 1. Notebook: Using the outline that is provided online for this course, take notes on the lectures. Focus your note-taking on the goal of preserving from this class experience the things that will be helpful to you in ministry. Take your notes in such a way that you can come back to them in the future as a summary and reminder of what you have studied. It would be especially important that you record the biblical passages that are cited to support different theological points of view
- 2. **Doctrinal Statement Assignment:** Write a paragraph for each of the items from the CCC Statement of faith listed below and explain how your study in this class as deepened your understanding of and appreciation of this section of the doctrinal statement.
 - **Intro:** The sole basis of our beliefs is the Bible, God's infallible written Word, the 66 books of the Old and New Testaments. We believe that it was uniquely, verbally and fully inspired by the Holy Spirit, and that it was written without error (inerrant) in the original manuscripts. It is the supreme and final authority in all matters on which it speaks.
 - #1: There is one true God, eternally existing in three persons--Father, Son and Holy Spirit-each of whom possesses equally all the attributes of Deity and the characteristics of personality.
 - #6 Man was originally created in the image of God. He sinned by disobeying God; thus, he was alienated from his Creator. That historic fall brought all mankind under divine condemnation.
 - #7 Man's nature is corrupted, and he is thus totally unable to please God. Every man is in need of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Ministry Application Project: Develop a bible study on a theological topic covered in this course that will be useful to you in ministry. Develop a teaching outline that you can use either as a message or as a discussion in a Bible study. Focus both on the biblical teaching on a theological doctrine and instruction on how to apply this teaching to everyday life.

Examples of possible topics might be

A Study of the Attributes of God Biblical Teaching on the Trinity Arguments for the existence of God Evangelism and the Sovereignty of God Prayer and the Sovereignty of God Argument for the Authority of Scripture Biblical Teaching on the Doctrine of Sin Any other topic covered in this course that would be helpful for you to be able to use in teaching and building into the lives of others.
